President's Message

It's nice to see the snow finally melting, trees budding and lawns reappearing. It is also wonderful to welcome so many new neighbors to Walnut Grove!

2023 Annual Meeting. We had excellent participation at our January 25, 2023 Annual Meeting, conducted again this year via Zoom. The Minutes of this meeting are on the website **here** for review. To get a fairly complete picture of what was covered at the meeting, you can see the agenda presented by a PowerPoint here. Thanks as always to Doug Hyant for his superb job moderating and tallying votes for this meeting. The 2023 budget (and fee assessment) proposed by the board to the owners at the meeting was approved 56 to 3. 2023 Board Members, including members elected this election cycle at the annual meeting, are listed on the following page. Friday, March 17th was the due date for paying the annual assessment. Checks, cash, PayPal are all options available for paying your dues. If you haven't yet submitted your payment please do so now.

Legacy Fund. We have now contributed some \$30,000 to an escrowed Greenways Legacy Fund for improving the four Greenway, primarily to repair and replace sections of the asphalt pathways. In 2021 and 2022 we funded the first annual contributions of \$15,000 to our Greenways Legacy Fund. This fund will help prepare us to address repair and replacement of the pathways in the future.

We have committed an additional \$15,000 in 2023. Please review the discussion in the Greenways Committee article on pages 4-5 below about the likelihood that at some point, to complete full repairs to the greenway pathways, the Legacy Fund will need to be augmented by a special assessment passed by the Homeowners.

We have begun our annual tree maintenance and trimming program using Eco Tree Company. Last year, Eco completed pruning all the trees in our circles, removed several diseased or damaged trees and planted several new trees. This past week Eco was back in our neighborhood removing several diseased and dying trees. Visit the Greenways Co-chairs article below at pgs. 4-5 for more information on the tree removal project and a potential to obtain firewood.

WGHA took a position last year against a Madison Metro Transit route through our neighborhood along North Westfield Road next to the park. Metro's new plan omits Westfield from its route map but still has easy access for us to the new Bus Rapid Transit System next year.

The Westfield Road traffic calming project is slated to start construction between April and July, and take about three weeks. The road will be useable during construction. The proposed bike trail around Walnut Grove Park appears stalled out for the time being.

We would love to increase participation in committees and subcommittees of the Association; Please contact me or a Committee chair (see next page for identities of chairs) to learn more and get involved! Homeowners are welcome to join in Greenway Committee Meetings which will be held on the second Tuesday of May, July and September at 7 pm in Walnut Grove Park on the lawn near the central park sign. Please bring a chair or blanket. Rain-date is the following Tuesday.



Greenway Volunteer Workdays

Greenway Volunteer Workdays will be on the second Saturday of May and July through September. The workday for June

will move to June 17th to avoid a conflict with the Walnut Grove Garage Sale scheduled for June 8-10. Rain-dates for any of these scheduled work days will be the following Saturday.

The workdays rendezvous location is on the Stonecrest Circle pathway entrance to Greenway D. Plan to bring personal items which may include work gloves, trowel, shovel, disposable lawn and leaf bags. All are welcome for any part of the work days which generally last 2 hours.

The focus of volunteer activities in May will be to install native perennials received as a grant from the UW Forest and Water Department, and to remove sapling trees within three feet of Greenway walkways and to maintain and improve the forested areas of the Greenways. Please be alert for an additional announcement seeking volunteers for the installation of Native Plants.

Contractor Work on Greenways

Replacement of several uneven or degraded areas of the walkways is to be completed this summer. Removal of several dead trees, as well as trees

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affected by disease was scheduled to begin on March 15, and is now completed. Portions of a mature cherry tree were left by Eco Tree Company on the ground near the Greenway D access walkway from the Oxwood Cul-du-Sac. Owners may remove any portions of the tree that remain for firewood.

Repairs of Pathways



The Legacy Fund was established in 2021 to begin building reserves to eventually replace the asphalt paths in our greenways. This could be done one greenway or path at a time over the course of many years. Alternatively, all the paths could be replaced at one time, likely more cost-effective than an incremental approach. However, a one-time special assessment of all WGHA households would be needed to raise sufficient funds to replace all the paths at once. Such a special assessment would require an election by all homeowners, conducted pursuant to WGHA by-laws.

There are several major considerations now clear to the Board of Directors:

- 1. Inflation has substantially increased annual expenses (admin/mowing/tree maintenance) and eaten into the ability of the WGHA to fund the goal of setting aside \$15,000 per year for the Legacy Fund.
- 2. Asphalt companies seem to have scrapped the types of paving equipment appropriate for paving pathways the width of our established paths. This may mean our future pathways will have to be widened.
- 3. Initial bids received to do all four greenways run into the \$270,000 range in 2022 dollars. The longer we wait to do the work, the more it will end up costing.
- 4. None of the asphalt paths are in immediate need for replacement, but will continue to deteriorate, increasing hazards for pedestrians and bicyclists.

The Board will do its best to keep all Walnut Grove homeowners informed about its future consideration of this issue.

ACC Report

The actions the Architectural Review Committee (ACC) took on applications for ACC approval in 2022 can be reviewed here, on page 15. All ACC records are on a cloud server, and if you wish to see how prior applications were handled for the type project you are contemplating, the records are available digitally for the asking at: architecture@walnutgrovemadison.org.

If you're contemplating improvements, it makes sense to initially contact an ACC member informally. Because our rules have requirements specific to individual

projects, we can point these out if you reach out informally. Otherwise, the ACC Application is found here. The New 2020 Covenants are on the Website here. And the ACC Rules and Procedures are here. Note that in the ACC Rules and Procedures there are several appendices to the Rules that set out the specific needs for your application, and constraints unique to it under the Covenants. Each appendix describes the type of project to which it applies.

The ACC is currently conducting a review of its Rules that may lead to modest changes that must first be approved by the Board.

ACC Report, Continued



We have seen an increase in applications for solar panels. The ACC supports this important renewable source of energy. While we would prefer to see the panels situated so they can't be seen from the front

of the lot, we recognize that this isn't always possible to maximally capture energy from the sun. However panels need to be flush against the roof, but for short supports. The picture to the left shows this kind of installation. Nevertheless, any type of alternative energy capture needs to be presented to the ACC. Please remember that the ACC is tasked with protecting the property value of each lot in Walnut Grove, including yours.

New Invasives in our Greenways and Gardens

Past newsletters have discussed plant invasives, including garlic mustard, and their impact on the ecology of our greenways. At the last annual meeting, concerns were raised by homeowners about two new invasives, this time members of the animal kingdom: Jumping Worms and Spongy Moths. It was agreed at the meeting to research these invasives and address them in the Spring Newsletter. This section presents a presentation on both species and their potential harm to the eco-system of the Greenways and your lawns and gardens.

Asian Jumping Worms A/K/A Snake Worms A/K/A Crazy Worms -

If you spend time gardening, you may have heard about "Jumping Worms," a/k/a Asian Jumping Worms, a/k/a Snake Worms Even if you are not a gardener, jumping worms are a problem you don't want to ignore. These worms can quickly take over wherever they are introduced. This includes our lawns, our gardens, our Greenways, and our wooded areas here in Walnut Grove.

What are they?

These are a series of invasive species of worms from Asia that have been identified in many areas of the U.S. They were first identified locally at the UW-Arboretum in 2013. Their common name comes from the high energy, thrashing motion they do...more snake-like than worm-like. The changes they cause to soil will lead to a poor environment for growing the things you do want (trees, native plants, ornamental plants) and a happy environment to grow things you don't want (invasive plants, weeds). Once infested by jumping worms, the depleted soil will look like coffee grounds!

How to identify them?

The Wisconsin DNR has a great photo and chart showing the difference between the Asian Jumping Worm and the European Earthworm most of us are familiar with.

How to Avoid introducing them in your yard?

While there is no guarantee, some suggestions include:

- Buy mulch from a reputable dealer and ask if they take steps to prevent jumping worms.
- Take a close look at the soil in new plants before purchasing and/or introducing to your yard (especially potted plants).
- Limit transplanting of outdoor plants and inspect soil before replanting.
- If purchasing worms (for fishing, composting, etc.), make sure they are not jumping worms.

How do I get rid of Jumping Worms?

If you find a jumping worm, throw it in the trash! These little buggers can outcompete other earthworms and quickly take over any soil in which they land. There are no chemical means of controlling a jumping worm infestation.

Spongy Moths

Spongy moths are an invasive species that lays eggs which then transform into caterpillars defoliate trees by consuming their leaves. While healthy trees can often survive this defoliation, weaker trees can not. Dane County has been a "quarantined county" for spongy moths since 2021. This means that nursery stock, unprocessed logs, lawn furniture and Christmas trees must be inspected and found free of eggs and caterpillars prior to being moved in location, particularly to an unquarantined area.

The life cycle of spongy moths present varied opportunities for controls. The adult moths themselves exist only to mate and have the female moths lay eggs then die. The eggs are typically laid in August in an egg mass on the trunk of trees. The egg mass may have 600 or more individual eggs attached. Below on the left is a picture of an egg mass on the bark of a tree:





The larvae in the egg mass hibernate over the winter, impervious to cold. As things warm up in the spring, the larvae chew their way out of their eggs, typically just as the seasonal foliation is expanding. The larvae transform into caterpillars that roam up and down tree trunks looking for foliage to devour to build up nutrients for the mating and new egg-laying cycle in the fall. Above on the right is a caterpillar chowing down on a

leaf. Early in development the caterpillars are quite dark and tend to feed during the day. As they reach fuller color in their fourth or fifth week, they start feeding at night to avoid bird predators, and they are such prodigious eaters that a tree can occasionally seem to lose its foliage overnight!

Trees that are most and least susceptible to spongy moth defoliation are:

So what to do?

- 1. If you think you've found spongy moth egg clusters or larvae (caterpillars) on a tree that is or might be on the Association's common area, put WGHA on notice of the problem by contacting: greenways@walnutgrovemadison.org.
- 2. If you find these problems on one of your trees, consider contacting a horticulturist or arborist, and please also let the Association know at the email address immediately above. When the larvae break free in the Spring, they can disperse by "ballooning" on the wind as far as 150 yards away from where they hatched. So an egg cluster found on one of your trees probably means, if it is not addressed, that we are all going to face a bigger problem come early summer.
- 3. By this time you are either fascinated with these little critters or not. If you are engaged by now and want detailed information on controlling them, UW Extension has complete advice for homeowners here. The methods for dealing with Spongy Moths varies with the time in their life cycle when you discover them. The advice at the UW Extension web page can be tersely described: "The only good spongy moth is a dead spongy moth." If that sounds a little cruel (insecticidal), just think of tree-after-tree having to be cut down and removed in our neighborhood at substantial cost to homeowners or the Association.
